### **CCIS Stands Strong**



# **A Volunteer Report**

**Feeling fortunate** 

My time spent hosting international students



Being a mom has taught me to be more appreciative of whatever comes into my life. One of my most fortunate or lucky moments was when I applied for a position to volunteer with the CCIS Hospitality program in the fall of 2017.

I vividly remember writing to Ms. Carol Hickingbotham, the chairperson of the program, of how excited I felt to be able to contribute to the international student community at Stanford University. I wanted to share with students my own experiences of having been an international student from my birth country of India, and how my journey had taken me through the highs and lows of student life.

My real life story of working 20 hour jobs on-campus on an near empty stomach, to graduating top of my MBA class with a "best outgoing student" award at the University's Commencement ceremony to working in an industry for which I had so much passion in one of the greatest cities in the world... I strongly felt like I had something to say to the brightest of bright minds who I would meet through a program such as the CCIS Hospitality program.

My first student was a woman named Yutong from China, who was pursuing a degree in Asian American studies from the school of Humanities and Sciences. I met and spoke with her on campus, where she felt most comfortable. She was so eager to talk to me about her first year living away from her younger brother and parents. Since then, I have had the opportunity to host a female student from Tel Aviv, Israel, whose spouse was a post-doctoral student at Stanford University. A third female student was from China, who, like Yutong, was pursuing an undergrad degree in the school of Humanities & Sciences.

One central theme which I found with the three students is that they were all eager to learn and unafraid to be themselves. They were brave and open to new experiences. I find these qualities to be the hallmark of a typical international student who has made Stanford campus her or his home.

As we enter into the post Covid era with vaccination initiatives firmly in place, I am hoping that CCIS can continue to open its loving arms to welcome more of these young and bright minds. The opportunities to nurture students but also gratefully learn from them is something CCIS members value.

I am excitedly looking forward to those opportunities and I know that I am not alone.
